This review provides a snapshot of the state-of-
art of School Feeding Programmes in 14 of the
15 CARICOM Member States. It provides an
overview of the different models of school
feeding programmes that currently exist in the
Caribbean, challenges faced and
recommendations for improvement. Among the

aspects evaluated include: the governance
structure, nutritional quality of meal served,
linkages with small farmers for the
procurement of products used in the meals,
involvement of children in school gardens
related activities, etc. The document includes a
case study for each of the participating
countries (namely Antigua and Barbuda,
Bahamas, Barbados, Belize, Dominica, Grenada,
Guyana, Haiti, Jamaica, St. Kitts and Nevis, St.
Lucia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines,
Suriname and Trinidad and Tobago). For each
of these countries, an Annual Net Benefit
Analysis was conducted, using information
collected in 2017. The aim is that the document
can provide preliminary information and
recommendations that can be relevant for
governments, public organizations, donors,
opinion leaders, private sectors, and others
toward strengthening school feeding
programmes in the Caribbean. It was developed
with the support of the University of the West
Indies and the Caribbean Agro-Economic
Society under the leadership of Prof. Carlisle
Pemberton and Dr. Hazel Paterson-Andrews.
This book provides an analytical discussion of
the status of disaster risk reduction and
governance in an Indian context, drawing
examples and lessons from the output of the

national and regional level programs and projects and from other relevant experiences in the country. Different types of disasters faced by Indian states are covered, including geophysical and hydrometeorological hazards. Human spaceflight is inherently risky, with numerous potential hazards posed at each phase of a mission. Potential health risks during spaceflights include short-term health consequences from being in microgravity, as well as long-term health consequences that arise, or continue, months or years after a flight. Additional health considerations are risks

posed by exposure to environmental contaminants onboard spacecraft. Because the International Space Station and spacecraft are closed environments that require recirculation of air and water supplies, some contamination of the air and water will occur. Even with onboard air and water purification systems, chemicals will accumulate in the air and water as they recirculate or are recycled onboard. Therefore, it is necessary for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) to identify hazardous contaminants and determine exposure levels that are not expected to pose a health risk to astronauts. NASA uses spacecraft maximum allowance concentrations (SMACs) and spacecraft water exposure guidelines (SWEGs) to provide guidance on acceptable exposures to air and water contaminants during normal operations and emergency situations. Refinements to the *Methods for Developing Spacecraft Exposure Guidelines* updates the methods for establishing SMACs and SWEGs and assists NASA with identifying chemicals that need updated SMACs or SWEGs and new chemicals for which these guidelines should be developed. Biopharmaceutical medicinal products (biologics) represent a huge financial market. Thus upon patent protection expiry of the innovator (reference) biologic there is interest from industry to gain a portion of this market by launching a 'similar' biologic at a reduced development cost, thus boosting potential gains. The EMA responded to this desire and
